

Details of Singapore – Hong Kong Air Travel Bubble

1.	Eligibility	 Any person, irrespective of his/her nationality/citizenship, who has remained in Singapore and/or Hong Kong in the last 14 consecutive days prior to departure is eligible to travel. [NEW] This 14-day period excludes any compulsory quarantine or Stay-Home Notice (SHN) period arising from their last return to Singapore or Hong Kong from overseas.
		<u>Departing from Singapore</u> Holders of Work Permits or S-Passes issued by the Singapore Ministry of Manpower working in the construction, marine shipyard, or process sectors are excluded from travelling from Singapore to Hong Kong on the ATB.
		Departing from Hong Kong [NEW] Hong Kong requires its residents to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 before departing on the ATB flights (i.e. after 14 days upon receiving two doses of COVID-19 vaccine). This requirement does not apply to Hong Kong residents:
		 (a) aged below 16; (b) not suitable for COVID-19 vaccination due to medical grounds; (c) with less than 90 days' stay in Hong Kong before departure; or (d) using non-Hong Kong travel documents for departure.
2.	Designated ATB Flights	Travellers from both cities must travel on designated flights serving only ATB travellers. Transit and non-ATB travellers are not allowed on the designated ATB flights.
		 From 26 May to 9 June 2021: Singapore to Hong Kong: 1 flight per day, with up to 200 travellers per flight; Hong Kong to Singapore: 1 flight per day, with up to 200 travellers per flight
		 From 10 June 2021 onwards: Singapore to Hong Kong: 2 flights per day, with up to 200 travellers per flight;



	 Hong Kong to Singapore: 2 flights per day, with up to 200 travellers per flight The number of flights will be allocated equally between Singapore-based and Hong Kong-based airlines. Travellers are to refer to the relevant airlines' websites for details of the designated flights.
3. Testing	 Pre-Departure COVID-19 Testing. Travellers¹ are required to take a pre-departure COVID-19 Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test within 72 hours before the scheduled departure time of the designated ATB flight and obtain a negative test result. Travellers can contact and take their test at one of the recognised clinics/testing centres/testing institutions. Singapore: https://go.gov.sg/covid19pcrtestproviders. Travellers² are required to take a COVID-19 test upon arrival at Changi Airport or Hong Kong International Airport (HKIA). On-Arrival COVID-19 Test in Singapore: Travellers are strongly encouraged to register and pre-pay for their on-arrival COVID-19 PCR test prior to departing Hong Kong at https://safetravel.changiairport.com. After taking the COVID-19 PCR test, travellers are to immediately take private transportation, taxi, or private hire car from the airport to their declared place of accommodation ³. They must remain isolated at the

¹ Children aged 6 or younger in that calendar year are <u>not</u> required to take a pre-departure COVID-19 PCR test before departing Hong Kong for Singapore.

² Children aged 6 or younger in that calendar year are <u>not</u> required to take an On-Arrival Test upon arrival at Changi Airport.

 $^{^3}$ Singapore Citizens, Permanent Residents and Long-Term Pass Holders may self-isolate at their place of residence until their test result is confirmed to be negative. Visitors must book an accommodation in Singapore to serve out their self-isolation period for 1 – 2 days while waiting for their test result. The accommodation must be non-residential and



		 accommodation until the test result is confirmed to be negative. Checks will be made to ensure that this is adhered to. After being notified of their negative test results, travellers will be allowed to go about their activities in Singapore. <u>On-Arrival COVID-19 Test in Hong Kong</u> Travellers must book and pay for the post-arrival COVID-19 PCR test at Hong Kong International Airport before departing Singapore. Travellers will remain in HKIA while awaiting their test results.
4.	Contact Tracing	TraceTogether To facilitate the contact tracing process, short-term visitors from Hong Kong will be required to download and register for the TraceTogether app on their mobile devices prior to departing for Singapore, keep it activated during their stay here, and not delete it for 14 consecutive days after leaving Singapore. [NEW] LeaveHomeSafe Travellers from Singapore are required to download and install the LeaveHomeSafe (LHS) app on their mobile devices prior to leaving Singapore for Hong Kong. During the duration of their stay in Hong Kong, travellers are required to scan the LHS QR codes displayed at the relevant premises they visit, and retain their LHS app visitation records for 31 consecutive days after leaving Hong Kong. 5.	Other Requirements	<u>Online Declaration</u> Travellers from Singapore to Hong Kong are required to fill in and submit health declaration by using the online Health & Quarantine Information Declaration Form within 48 hours prior to arrival in Hong Kong and get the relevant QR code at <u>https://www.chp.gov.hk/hdf</u> . Travellers for Hong Kong to Singapore are required to fill in and submit the SG Arrival card within 3 days prior to arrival in Singapore at <u>https://eservices.ica.gov.sg/sgarrivalcard</u> .

		<u>Air Travel Pass</u> Short-term visitors ⁴ from Hong Kong will need to apply for an Air Travel Pass (ATP) between seven and thirty calendar days prior to their intended date of entry into Singapore. With immediate effect, travellers can apply for the ATP for entry into Singapore on or after 26 May 2021. More details can be found at <u>https://safetravel.ica.gov.sg.</u> <u>Medical costs</u>
		Should travellers become COVID-19 positive while in Hong Kong, they will need to bear the full cost of any medical treatment, subject to the respective cities' prevailing medical and healthcare policies.
		As part of the requirements under the ATP, short-term visitors from Hong Kong must purchase travel insurance, with a minimum coverage of S\$30,000 for COVID-19-related medical treatment and hospitalisation cost, prior to travel to Singapore. 		Public Health Measures Travellers must comply with the prevailing public health and safe distancing measures in Singapore and Hong Kong. These include mask wearing and restrictions on group gatherings.
6.	Suspension / Resumption	The ATB will be suspended for at least 14 days if the seven-day moving average of the daily number of unlinked local COVID-19 cases (excluding dormitory resident cases in Singapore) is more than five in either Singapore or Hong Kong. The suspension will take effect after two days (including the day on which the criteria was met) for a two-week period.
		The ATB can resume on the next day when the following two criteria have been met:
		 (i) the seven-day moving average of the daily number of unlinked local COVID-19 cases in Hong Kong and Singapore does not exceed five on the last day of the 14-day suspension period or any subsequent day; and (ii) after criterion (i) is met, subsequently there are three consecutive days where the daily number of unlinked local

⁴ Singapore Citizens, Singapore Permanent Residents and Singapore Long-Term Pass (LTP) holders are not required to apply for an ATP. LTP holders refer to Work Pass holders, Student's Pass holders, Long-Term Visit Pass holders and Dependant's Pass holders, as well as those who have been granted In-Principle Approval for a LTP. LTP holders need to apply for an Approval Letter for Entry as per the arrangement today.



	COVID-19 cases does not exceed three in Hong Kong and Singapore, and the seven-day moving average of the daily number of unlinked local COVID-19 cases on the last day of the three consecutive days does not exceed five in both places.
